Penmanship Angie Steele

Prerequisites: None

Ages: 6 to 11

Tuition: \$90.00 for 32 half-hour sessions

Materials Fee: \$40.00 (includes workbook and all writing materials)

Frustrated by how your child holds a pencil? Unable to read your child's writing? It is not too late to improve this important skill and correct bad habits, but it requires a concerted effort and proper training. Welcome to penmanship class! An early morning half-hour offering which will train a broad age range of Grammar Level students to improve their handwriting and penmanship. Students will start by learning to write the alphabet using a simplified script, developing into cursive, with proper form. Their practice will refine their skills. Proper pencil and paper position will be stressed and old bad habits replaced by new proper ones. Daily homework practice will take 15-20 minutes.

Through the Seasons Renee LaFaver

Prerequisites: None

Ages: 3 to 5 **Tuition**: \$145.00

Materials Fee: \$10.00

Preschoolers and early elementary students will walk, jump, and skip through the seasons of the year as we engage in enriching activities which highlight a variety of themes! We will practice days of the week and months of the year, review coins and play "store," learn to recognize patterns and talk about the hands of a clock...just to name a few! Being mindful of God's creation will be evident as we color, make crafts, and read books! Manipulatives are used each week! Young learners will also be introduced to simple Spanish words as they recite them throughout stories and sing songs, adding a special dimension to our weekly discoveries!

Early American History for Children II

Mimi Larsen

Prerequisites: None

Ages: 5 to 7 Tuition: \$145.00 Materials Fee: \$35.00

This class is a literature-based approach to learning American history for young children, ages 5 to 7. The students will learn about our nation's history as they listen to "living" books about famous Americans and notable events and places between the 1800's and the present day. We'll start with Reconstruction and take a ride on the railroad through the Industrial Revolution, learning about great inventors such as Edison and Bell. Then we'll move on to the Progressive Era and the Great Depression, finishing with modern medical advancements, a trip to the moon, and a fun study of our last two states, Alaska and Hawaii! In-class activities and craft projects will reinforce and supplement the people, places, and events studied. The students will create their own Early American History Book, completing pages weekly. Homework is optional. Early American History for Children I is not a prerequisite.

Geography Discoverers A & Geography Explorers B

Prerequisites: None

Ages: Level A is for ages 5 to 7; Level B is for ages 7 to 9

Tuition: \$90.00 for 32 half-hour sessions

Materials Fee: \$25.00

Discoverer Geography students will develop map skills by learning basic map symbols, including references to land, water, cities, and roads while using the cardinal directions. We will learn to recognize the United States, Virginia, and Washington, DC on a globe and discover oceans and other water and landforms. We will use maps, diagrams, pictures, books, and of course games and even songs to discover geography.

Explorer Geography students will work on similar skills as Discoverers, but will also begin to explore other states and countries. We will work on memorizing all the continents and their places on the globe. More landforms and water forms will be explored around the world! We will practice using and creating our own maps and diagrams, while enjoying books, games, and songs as well.

Poetry & Recitation A/B (Year II)

Kacky Kasinski

Prerequisites: None

Ages: Level A is for ages 5 to 7; Level B is for ages 7 to 9

Tuition: \$90.00 for 32 half-hour sessions

Materials Fee: \$30.00

Good poetry uses words to engage the imagination and stimulate thoughts. It is able to move words from the intellectual realm and connect them to the emotional realm, placing a deeper impression on our mind and heart. Poetry lends itself to memorization and can be used to lift emotions and teach truths. In this class students will be exposed to and discuss poems. They will also have the opportunity to memorize selected poems which they will recite in class.

Please be aware that there is a three year cycle of this class: Year I, Year II, and Year III. A student could take poetry three years in a row before the same material is covered again. Each of the three years will have different weekly poetry sheets and different memory poems. If your child has already taken this class and would like to take it again, wonderful! He or she will hear and memorize different poems than the year before.

Class overview: In class each week we will read new poems together. The selection of weekly poems will be organized by theme, author, or type. Class discussions will include interpretation of the poems as well as learning about key elements of poetry. A new poetry sheet will be given to the students each week. A binder to hold these poetry sheets will be provided. While the week's collection of poems are being read to the students, the students will have the opportunity to color in the provided illustrations or coloring sheet.

Each week for homework, students will be asked to spend 5-10 minutes daily memorizing an assigned memory poem or part of a memory poem. The memory poems will be given as a laminated card, so it can be easily taken out of the binder and used for memory work at home. The students will be encouraged to recite this poem or part of the poem orally in class the following week. At the end of the school year, the students will have an opportunity to recite all of the memory poems and earn a Poetry Memory Master Medal.

BONUS: At the beginning of each semester or the school year, students will be given a craft kit which will have supplies for completing crafts related to the various poetry themes. These crafts can be created at home as an extra supplement but are not required. They are just for fun! The students can bring their completed crafts back to school to show the class

Ecosystem Exploration

Prerequisites: None

Ages: 8 to 10 Tuition: \$145.00 Materials Fee: \$45.00 Camryn Kenna

In this class, students will explore different ecosystems through observation, nature journaling, and hands-on activities. Students will discover the big picture of each ecosystem as well as the smaller components (plants, animals, weather, landscape, etc.) that all work together to make the system function.

In the first half of the year, we will focus on the ecosystems that surround us as we look at forests and fields. Weather permitting, students will spend a portion of each class period outside working in their nature journals. We'll take a closer look at the creatures and systems we observe outdoors through experiments and the creation of our own terrariums. In the second half of class, we will turn our attention to the rivers and oceans of our world. Students will study the ecosystems existing in these environments through field books, examination of marine fossils, and hands-on experiments, and will continue to record their findings in their nature journals.

Sketchbooks for nature journaling are included in the materials fee, but students should bring either pencils or colored pencils (or both) to class.

Sing for Joy Sofia Cuddeback

Prerequisites: None **Ages:** 8 to 11

Tuition: \$145.00 Materials Fee: \$20.00

This course is designed to introduce the grammar-aged child to the building blocks of singing, which are basic voice production, pitch production, and sight singing. The first semester will utilize Christmas carols to implement these techniques because, though they are musically simple, Christmas carols are aesthetically beautiful and profound, while their texts are incredibly important in conveying an important aspect of the Judeo-Christian patrimony. The second semester will focus on age-appropriate rounds, folk songs, and choral pieces. Both semesters will be couched in the Ward Method of teaching children fundamental sight singing, and composition techniques. Each year utilizes a different variety of songs while continuing to reinforce music theory principles and, as such, this course is appropriate for repeat enrollment.

Discovering the Great Artists

Prerequisites: None

Ages: 9 to 11
Tuition: \$145.00
Materials Fee: \$50.00

Angie Steele

Exploring the artists' backgrounds and critiquing their works of art, students will study some of the Great Masters from the past to the present. The majority of each class will be spent doing a hands-on activity, using different mediums, in which the students will apply the styles and techniques of the artists while allowing for individual creativity.

Seasonal Art through Stories Amy Flynn

Prerequisites: None

Ages: 3 to 5 Tuition: \$145.00 Materials Fee: \$50.00

"The Heavens declare the glory of God, the skies proclaim the work of His hands." Psalm 19:1

Through the use of storybooks, famous artwork, and observations, we will follow the changing seasons as we learn about the world around us. We will consider the beauty, intricacies, and patterns of God's creations as we create artwork of our own. While using a wide variety of materials, we will focus on developing small motor skills such as holding a pencil, stringing beads, gluing, coloring, cutting, etc. Our mediums will include not only traditional art supplies, but nature itself. The sky's the limit!

Ready, Set, Read! Camryn Kenna

Prerequisites: None

Ages: 5 to 7*
Tuition: \$145.00
Materials Fee: \$45.00

This is a beginning reading program, not a class for fluent readers, but a knowledge of letters and their basic sounds is required. In the first half of the class, students will study the fifty most common sight words as well as learn the basic phonics of vowels and consonants. We will practice reading and writing basic sentences and will reinforce our study of phonics with interactive games.

Based on class readiness, in the second half of the school year we will focus more on parts of speech and building sentences as necessary for reading. Small books will be used to develop reading skills and we will continue to review our studies with games, worksheets, and group read-alouds.

Homework will be given each class. Take-home packets with 5-8 pages will be used every week. Parents should expect to spend at least ten minutes a day reviewing the sight words and homework with their student. Adjustments will be made based upon the needs of the class.

Word Roots A/B Amanda White

Prerequisites: None

Ages: Level A is for ages 5 to 7; Level B is for ages 7 to 9

Tuition: \$90.00 for 32 half-hour sessions

Materials Fee: \$35.00

The Word Roots curriculum from The Critical Thinking Company teaches students the meanings of Latin prefixes, roots, and suffixes commonly used in English. Learning word elements dramatically improves spelling and the ability to decode unfamiliar words. Word Roots will add hundreds of words to your students' vocabulary and greater depth to their thinking and writing.

This class (at both levels) is only suitable for students who are already independent readers. Homework will consist of daily review for 5-10 minutes, and weekly worksheets which should require approximately 15-30 minutes to complete.

^{*}Eight year olds that may benefit from this training are welcome to enroll without requiring an exception.

Math Skills A/B Regina Iriarte

Prerequisites: None

Ages: Level A is for ages 5 to 7; Level B is for ages 7 to 9

Tuition: \$90.00 for 32 half-hour sessions

Materials Fee: \$25.00

An exciting, fun, and active half hour of math! This class will revolve around games and use rote memorization. Students will be evaluated the first week and the games and activities will be tailored to their needs. Some of the topics that we will be exploring include addition and subtraction fact families, skip counting, multiplication facts, time, money, geometry, and patterns. Games and hands-on activities will be the main mode of learning. This class is aimed to help foster confidence and create a firm foundation in early math skills. Homework is optional.

Story of the World III: Early Modern Ages

Prerequisites: None Ages: 8 to 10 Tuition: \$145.00 Materials Fee: \$45.00

This class will offer a broad study with a world-wide view of the Modern Era, beginning with the reign of Elizabeth I. Students will listen to stories about world civilizations as we progress through time to learn the notable people, places, and events spanning a variety of countries on all continents. Come learn about the Sun King, Catherine the Great, the New World, African traditions, Asian influences, the Industrial Revolution, and more. In-class map work, craft activities, and projects will enhance this interactive approach to make learning history fun. Copy of the text is not required. Homework is optional.

Learning through Literature

Angie Steele

Prerequisites: None Ages: 9 to 11 Tuition: \$145.00 Materials Fee: \$25.00

With a focus on Newbery Award-winning books, students will develop the fundamental skills necessary to recognize literary elements of a story, such as characterization, setting, plot, conflict, and theme. Weekly classroom participation will be expected as we discuss the books. In-class activities will be designed to teach the students to interact with and understand the stories. At home, the students will read weekly from the assigned literature and answer comprehension questions to be discussed in class. Several book responses will also be assigned. This class is considered a bridge class to the Upper Level.

Books for the class include: *My Side of the Mountain* by Jean Craighead George, *Number the Stars* by Lois Lowry, *Carry on Mr. Bowditch* by Jean Lee Latham, *Island of the Blue Dolphins* by Scott O'Dell, *Roll of Thunder Hear My Cry* by Mildred D. Taylor.

US Geography through Literature

Kacky Kasinski

Prerequisites: None Ages: 10 to 12 Tuition: \$145.00 Materials Fee: \$25.00

Using the Beautiful Feet Literature Guide, we will explore US geography through Holling C. Holling's beautiful books: *Paddle-to-the-Sea*, *Tree in the Trail*, and *Minn of the Mississippi*. We will be introduced to World Geography through the book *Seabird*. After listening to chapters in class, students will label and color the beautiful map set especially prepared for these book studies. Some class times students will take turns reading but no one is ever required to read out loud. As we follow the stories, we will have discussions in each class as we define and learn about

new geographic terms and places we encounter. No homework will be given. Materials fee covers the large map set, colored pencils (so everyone can use the same colors), and photocopies. Students need to be aware that a decent portion of the class is spent labeling and nicely coloring in the maps. When students use their best efforts, they end up with beautiful keepsake maps.

<u>Charlotte Mason Primer</u> Marina Bise

Prerequisites: None

Ages: 3 to 5 Tuition: \$145.00 Materials Fee: \$20.00

This primer class will introduce your child to the educational feast of learning about the beauty in our world with a variety of living books. Subjects and activities will include poetry for improving memorization skills, picture study for exposure to beautiful art, nature/listening walks (weather permitting), and nature-inspired crafts to become better acquainted with the natural world around us. Numbers and the alphabet will be gently introduced. This class covers different material every two years and can be taken more than once.

<u>Fables and Folktales</u>

Ages: 5 to 7 Tuition: \$145.00 Materials Fee: \$30.00

Welcome to the world of Aesop's Fables and Folktales! Students will listen to the stories, provide oral retellings, engage in dramatic interpretations when appropriate, understand the "moral of a story" when applicable, and create a culminating project of a favorite fable or tale. All supplies will be provided including the creation of a book compiling a page for each tale.

Science in a Jar Melinda Topham & Melissa Patterson

Prerequisites: None

Ages: 6 to 8 Tuition: \$145.00 Materials Fee: \$45.00

Science in a Jar offers an exciting hands-on opportunity for students to explore the wonders of the world around them. Scientific concepts will be introduced through living books and classroom discussion. Using jars of various shapes and sizes, students will perform experiments each week with mainly common household ingredients. Students will be given a workbook to guide them through the scientific method. They will make predictions, perform experiments, and record observations. Each child will be encouraged to share their discoveries with the class all while expanding their scientific vocabulary and gaining an understanding of the observed results. Most projects will be completed in class, but occasionally students will take home an experiment for observation. We will explore weather, chemical reactions, hydraulics, density, botany, and much more!

Fifty Nifty States Renee LaFaver

Prerequisites: None

Ages: 7 to 9 Tuition: \$145.00 Materials Fee: \$10.00

Let's hit the road and find out what makes each state in our country unique! Students will start this year by learning how to create a floor plan of their bedroom or playground area and progress to being able to know what they are

seeing on different kinds of maps. Activities and games will grab their attention as we introduce the regional location of states and highlight landforms, waterways, and capital cities. We'll tackle abbreviations and special geographic features. Kids will also have opportunities to work in teams in order to help build their knowledge base! Please purchase The Complete Book of Maps and Geography, ISBN-10: 0769685595, ISBN-13: 978-0769685595 (© 2009) and have your student bring it to class on the first day of school, along with pencils. Colored pencils may also be used!

Signing for Kids: through Songs and Stories (Year B)

Prerequisites: None

Ages: 7 to 9 **Tuition:** \$145.00

Materials Fee: \$30.00 (Binder, Class Supplies, and Handouts)

American Sign Language (ASL) is a visual language using shape, placement, and movement of the hands along with facial expression and body movement to communicate. It is primarily used in the United States and Canada. In this class, students will have the opportunity to learn and use the ASL alphabet, ASL numbers, and a large variety of signs for the purposes of signing songs, poems, prayers, and stories. No previous knowledge of ASL is needed as the focus of this class is learning signs in the context of songs and stories and then performing the final product at the end of the year. Games will be used often to review signs and give the students an opportunity to practice signing with one another. In class, we will learn our new signs, review our old signs, and work together to sign out the songs, poems, prayers, and stories we are learning.

For homework each week the students will need to practice the new signs learned and review previously learned signs and, periodically, complete a homework sheet. Homework sheets and reviewing of signs will take 5-10 minutes each day. Students will receive a binder (or folder) for carrying home sign language flash cards, sheets with signs for songs, poems, prayers, and stories, along with class papers. By the end of the year, the students will invite their parents to join us for a signed performance. For example, in the past we have learned and performed *The Very Hungry Caterpillar* by Eric Carle.

Please note that there is a two year cycle to these signing classes. Year A and Year B are independent of each other and a student can take both. Some of the signs taught will be the same in each year, but different signs will be taught in Year A than in Year B. Year A's main focus is learning signs based on themes (food, feelings, animals, etc.) and Year B's main focus is learning signs for the purposes of signing songs and stories. If your child has taken this class this year and would like to take it again next year, that would be wonderful!

Classical Studies: Founding Fathers

Nancy Juday

Prerequisites: None Ages: 10 to 12 Tuition: \$145.00 Materials Fee: \$30.00

Students in this class will gain insight into early American government and history through biographical materials, class lectures, and literature. They will focus on the lives and contributions of some of the more prominent Founders and Framers including George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, George Mason, James Madison, Benjamin Franklin, and Patrick Henry. Students will explore the colonization of America, the Revolutionary War, the Declaration of Independence, the U.S. Constitution, and the influence of the Roman Republic on our Founding Fathers. They will also study various Articles of the Constitution, the three branches of government, the amendment process, and the Bill of Rights. Field trips to Montpelier, the home of James Madison, and the U.S. Capitol are also planned. This one hour class is geared toward the older Grammar Level student who is able to read and write fairly easily. Students will prepare a biographical presentation of a Founding Father and will be assigned two biographies to be read independently. Weekly homework assignments should take no longer than thirty minutes and will be based on class lectures and activities. Periodically, students will take short quizzes on class assignments.

Circle Time with Great Books

Prerequisites: None

Ages: 3 to 5 Tuition: \$145.00 Materials Fee: \$50.00

Gathering for a fun and interactive circle time each class, we will use movement songs, literature, and art projects (lots of them!) to reinforce fine and gross motor skills. Lessons will be based on a selection of great children's literature, we will spend time exploring shapes, numbers, letters, days of the week, months of the year, weather, nursery rhymes, and more.

<u>Living Lessons: Form I</u> Marina Bise

Ages: 5 to 7 Tuition: \$145.00 Materials Fee: \$35.00

Based on the Charlotte Mason principle that children will make their own relationship with what they observe and are presented with, a feast of ideas will be spread before them in an attempt to kindle and foster a passion for the good, the true, and the beautiful. This "First Form" of Living Lessons will provide each child with a feast of ideas and "things worth observing" through picture study, poetry study, living books, handicrafts and nature study. Dividing the year into three terms, this class will do an in-depth study of three artists (with beautiful art prints to take home and share with the family) and three poets. We will explore and practice the art of nature journaling based on Law's *Guide to Nature Journaling*. The children will also spend time together with delightful, inspiring, and informative living books.

Science in Creation Debbie Snyder

Prerequisites: None

Ages: 6 to 8 Tuition: \$145.00 Materials Fee: \$30.00

In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth. Genesis 1:1

Using the **Days of Creation** as a guide, students enjoy discovery-oriented science lessons, simple experiments, and creative projects designed to encourage the joy of learning and an appreciation for the world around us. Subjects covered include the scientific method, light and darkness, colors, plants (botany), habitats, the solar system, the sun and moon, planets, gravity, magnetism, ocean life, mammals, anthropology, and much more! Most work will be completed during class, with occasional take home activities. Skills developed will include hypothesis formation, observation, and light note taking. This class is a good first introduction to science or a building block for young students with science experience.

Prima Latina I Leigh Ann Lynch

Prerequisites: None

Ages: 7 to 9 Tuition: \$145.00 Materials Fee: \$40.00

Prima Lingua Latina I is the entry-level and first of a two-year rotation to an introduction to Latin. Prima I is an enriching experience and fun preparatory course for students who plan to take Latin in the Upper Level, though it is not a prerequisite for Upper Level Latin. Students who start their Latin experience with Prima Latina I and II will be ready to ease into Latin ½ offered 2026-2027. Prima Latina II will be offered the following year in 2025-26, will have the prerequisite of Prima Latina I.

Using much of the same vocabulary as the first six chapters of the Upper Level text, *Lingua Latina*, students will learn basic grammar, declensions, and Latin mottos. Students will also be introduced to the geography of Rome ("Rome was Built on Seven Hills!"), Roman culture, history focusing on the kingdom of Rome, and Latin songs, poems, and prayers. A weekly homework page will require about 15 minutes to complete, as well as daily memory work practicing poems and endings from which students will benefit significantly. All Prima students are encouraged to take advantage of the weekly "Memory Period" which starts at 8:10 a.m. and lasts fifteen minutes.

US Presidents Amy Flynn

Prerequisites: None Ages: 8 to 10
Tuition: \$145.00

Materials Fee: \$30

Our nation's government is built on a system of checks and balances, and the president is a major part of that! In order to set the stage for the year, we will begin with a brief overview of our government and how it functions so that no one branch has too much power. After that we will dive into the roles and responsibilities of the president. Once that is covered, our weekly lessons will focus on individual presidents in chronological order. We will get to know these individuals not only as leaders of our country, but as ordinary citizens. We will learn what drove them to pursue the most important office in our country and what legacy they left behind after leaving office. We will do all of this in an engaging style that keeps the class interesting and students wanting to come back. By the end of the class, the hope is the students will be able to name all the presidents in order along with a fact or two. Most work will be done during class, although occasionally there may be short homework assignments requiring no more than 30-45 min./week.

Living Lessons: Form III Jessica Meza

Prerequisites: None Ages: 10 to 12 Tuition: \$145.00 Materials Fee: \$45.00

Living Lessons III will spread a feast of lovely and excellent ideas before your child through picture study, poetry, living books, and nature study. We will take an in depth look at three great artists and three excellent poets. Students will practice narration (telling back) with readings from Jean Henri Fabre, Beatrix Potter, Thornton Burgess, and others. This year we will start with oral narration and move towards short written narrations to be completed in class. To round out our time together, we will explore the outdoors and practice the art of keeping a nature journal using John Muir Law's *The Laws Guide to Nature Journaling and Drawing*. Nature Journaling and drawing get better with practice; with that in mind, students will be asked to complete a nature journal entry at home each week.

Writing Apprentice: Narrative Melissa McKay

Prerequisites: None Ages: 10 to 12 Tuition: \$145.00 Materials Fee: \$25.00

This class is designed to make writing accessible and fun for students who naturally enjoy writing, as well as those who don't! Students earn stars when they turn in assignments; stars are "cashed in" for books from the Treasure Chest throughout the year! Students who hate writing usually dislike it because they feel inadequate in the subject. This class breaks writing into bite-sized pieces, allowing students to experience small repeated successes so they can step into future writing classes with greater confidence. Good writing springs from reading, hearing, and imitating quality literature, so we'll use strong literary examples as models for students' own creative writing. Your student will be empowered to write well by playing with the building blocks of language and story. We'll use an adapted version of Classical Academic Press' Writing and Rhetoric books. Students will revise their work based on constructive teacher feedback and will have opportunities to share their work with each other in class. The average student should expect to spend about an hour per week at home polishing old work and generating new material by practicing what we explored in class. Assignments will be self-explanatory and shouldn't require the help of a parent. Students will need a 3-ring binder with notebook paper, and a writing utensil (or computer, if your student prefers to type assignments), but the materials fee covers everything else needed for class.

N.B. All Fifth period classes meet 3x/month for 1.5 hours; they do not meet on Classical Enrichment days.

Picture Biographies Story Hour B

Prerequisites: None

Ages: 4 to 8 Tuition: \$175.00 Materials Fee: \$35.00

In Picture Biographies Story Hour, we will read all about people who have made a difference in the world by simply being the person God wanted them to be. Whether well-known or not-so-well-known, we will explore a large variety of people including scientists, artists, musicians, performers, and inventors. During our class, we will read one or two themed-related biographies and engage in fun activities built around the theme to assist us to better understand the person and the talents that they had. Students will create a "keepsake" portfolio to help record thoughts from literature in a tangible form (with age appropriate expectations). Whether digging for dinosaur bones, creating artwork, or listening to music, your child will surely enjoy and connect to multiple persons we read about in the picture biographies. A sampling of our books includes: *The Boy Who Loved Math: The Improbable Life of Paul Erdős, Fossil Huntress: Mary Leakey, Paleontologist,* and *Hidden Figures: The True Story of Four Black Women and the Space Race.* Material fees go towards keepsake notebooks, hands-on activities, and supplies for arts and crafts. Did you take it last year? No problem! All the books and projects will be new!

Science & Engineering

Renee LaFaver

Prerequisites: None

Ages: 5 to 8 Tuition: \$175.00 Materials Fee: \$35.00

Using a wide variety of materials, students will work in small groups to design possible solutions to engineering challenges and perform science experiments. Scientific concepts such as friction, center of gravity, equilibrium, and displacement will be introduced through literature and discussed. Class conversations center on overcoming perceived difficulties of the challenges and sharing success stories! Projects include creating a suspension bridge, slingshot car, gumdrop dome, and a PVC ladder toss game - just to name a few! A break for recreation will be offered halfway through class each week. Young engineers will need to bring a notebook to class each week to use for planning, drawing, and recording details and observations.

Living Lessons: Form II

How tall can you build a tower? How much weight can your boat support? How strong is your bridge? How far and how accurate can your airplane fly? In STEAM Challenges, students will explore questions like these and come up with the best solution. Each class, the students will be given simple materials and a challenge to complete. Projects throughout the year will allow students to experiment in areas of science, technology, engineering, art, and math. Some of the exciting projects from Da Vinci Designs will be included, like hydraulic judobots and water rockets. These types of projects will give the students self-confidence that they can construct dynamic machines. STEAM Challenges will give students opportunities to develop problem solving skills, work together as a team, and expand their creativity.

Adventures in Narnia

We will travel through these inspiring fantasy books, exploring the wonderful land of Narnia, learning about the Pevensie children, sharing our impressions of their adventures in Narnia, learning to love Aslan and in turn, developing a love for reading. Students will actively read and discuss important quotes, underlining and highlighting them in our books. Students will also learn literary terms such as symbolism, metaphor, contrast, climax, and learn to look for them while reading. We will marvel at the hidden truths, deep mysteries, and spiritual treasures throughout the

Chronicles of Narnia. At home, students will read weekly from the literature and answer comprehension questions which will be discussed in class. There will be a creative book response at the end of reading each book. Students should have a set of books that they can mark in and make their own!

Study Hall

Ages: 12* Fee: \$20.00

Study Hall is intended for students ages twelve and older, *but mature ten and eleven year olds who are responsible enough to sit and work independently and silently for an entire hour may also enroll. Only one study hall is permitted per day. Students must bring enough work to occupy their time, or a book to read, and understand that Study Hall is not social hour. Study Hall Monitors do not assist with schoolwork. Students must register for Study Hall in advance. Attendance will be taken weekly, and parents will be notified if ever the student is absent or misbehaves. Students enrolled in study hall are expected to conduct themselves in a mature and respectful manner. If students choose to disregard the rules, they will be asked to leave for the remainder of the year to spend that hour under the close supervision of their parents or off campus. Study Hall is offered throughout the day as long as classrooms are available. See the Family Contract for more details.

Students in Latin 2/3 and up may participate in this event. Those in grades seven and up may choose to participate in the National Junior Classical League Convention that occurs one week every summer (usually in late July). Students will receive information on these conventions from their Latin teachers at the appropriate time. Memory Period Amanda White

All students are invited to attend a 15-minute memory period of Latin drill from 8:10—8:25 a.m. on Thursday mornings (Memory Period is not held on CE days; see description above). A classical education should provide rich opportunities to learn about the cultures, customs, history, and language of the ancient Greek and Roman civilizations.
